FUND-RAISING

PAST

Fund-raising activities culminated on 16 November when two events were held. There was the usual successful Coffee Morning in the West church hall which raised £447.

In the evening Historylinks was filled with members and invited representatives of Dornoch business for an informal presentation of Historylinks activities and exchange of views on heritage matters.

The highlight of the event was the drawing of the winners in the Summer Draw performed by MSP Jamie Stone. The first prize went to Lesley Bell of the bookshop. The other winners were evenly distributed around the whole of the UK which showed the wide appeal of the lottery.

The draw made a profit of £268. The committee has decided not to repeat the lottery in 2003 but is considering running it again in 2004.

The presence of the Society at the County Show generated great interest and encouraged a fair number of new members to join.

FUTURE

The traditional Spring Coffee Morning will be held on 3 May in the West Church Hall. The Society will also be present at the Wemyss Fair and the County Show.

Quiz walks will be arranged during the height of the tourist season (July and the first two weeks of August) on every Sunday afternoon when Historylinks will be open.

Tiles can still be ordered through Sylvia Park for mounting in Historylinks.

A special summer lecture about genealogy is also under consideration.

DORNOCH HERITAGE SOCIETY AND PLANNING

At the request of members the Committee held an extraordinary meeting on 14 November to hear members views on the planning application for 10 Carnaig St in Littletown. It was agreed to oppose the application as it would fundamentally change the area which is of heritage significance.

The Society presented its views to the Planning Committee. The application was subsequently turned down.

It is not the policy of the Society to consider every

planning application within Dornoch, but it will be active when it perceives that damage could be done to the town's built heritage.

It is monitoring the proposals for the fillingstation site but as yet no formal application has been made. The Highland Council has promised full public consultation should an application be made. The Society will act in accordance with members' views after such a consultation.

ONGOING PROJECTS

RAILWAY FILM

We now have a sound archive of reminiscences about the railway provided through recordings made with our members. This led to video-recordings being made at the Strathspey Steam Railway including one of the drivers on the line. This material will be reduced to a video archive of about two hours in total.

By the time this newsletter is issued all the railway related material in Historylinks should have been videoed.

Based on this recorded material a new manuscript for a film for visitors will be written and necessary new footage will be shot. There may also be a separate compilation for more local consumption.

HERITAGE TRAIL

The last bit of funding for this project costing more than £30,000 has been applied for. It is hoped that the project will be complete by the height of the summer.

The main emphasis is on a trail round Dornoch with new interpretative signage and portable audio guides in several languages that visitors can listen to as they walk round the trail. There will also be educational packs for schools.

The proposed signage will be displayed in the Carnegie Library for comment 2 - 10 March and can be discussed with the designers on 10 March at 7.30 pm in the Council Chamber.
