Before the construction of the new houses on the site of the old hotel which burnt down in 1941, an archaeological survey was carried out by John Wood and his team. John later gave a talk about their finds called 'Digging Dornoch' on 18 October and there is a display in Historylinks.

Andrew Macleod remembers the night of the fire. The fire brigade were using one small hose and taking water out of burn. He recalls seeing the piano in the upstairs lounge falling through the ceiling into the ground floor dining room. Perhaps most affected was owner Hector Ross standing in his pyjamas (which was all he had left) with tears rolling down his face at loss of his cairn terrier.

Ian Ross-Harper - An appreciation.

On behalf of all those involved with the Dornoch Heritage Society and Historylinks this is a personal recollection of Ian in which I have tried to sum up the debt we owe him.

I suppose my first memory of Ian was in the East Sutherland Art Society when we used to meet at Golspie every week and attempt to paint. Ian was painting an osprey with a fish in its talons. He was very enthusiastic and, as I was to find out, this was always the case with his many interests.

We both lived in Dornoch and, I suppose amongst other things, he must have talked to me about the Dornoch Heritage Society. I went to the occasional lecture and did a few posters for them and then out of the blue at an AGM chairman Ian Ross- Harper proposed me to be a committee member. A few years on I was to take over from Ian as chairman.

Those in-between years working with Ian laid the framework for what was to become the Historylinks Museum. The regular committee meetings had been trying to formulate a plan to get a new building to house the collection that had been built up by Jimmy Bell and others. It was being stored in a Dornoch Academy classroom, which was not ideal, and with only temporary displays at an annual exhibition in Station Square and upstairs in the Library, (once shared with the Art Society) it had long been a dream to find something more permanent.

Things progressed, but it was slow and on many occasions we came away from our meetings feeling a bit overwhelmed and subdued by the enormity of our task. We had very little money but eventually with a degree of luck and help from unexpected quarters we had the ground, we had plans, we had our funding and work began. We continued to have our meetings which had very little to do with heritage but lots do with things like cash flow and VAT and construction.

It was a worrying time but through it all Ian continued with his undiminished enthusiasm for the project. He held us all together and kept our morale up. He was a Royal Navy man. He knew his objective and always aimed for quality. He was always there helping out at the many fund-raising events. He never failed to thank you for doing something however small. He was always a gentleman.

On many an occasion I would go round to his house to discuss some building issue and sooner or later after sharing a dram the conversation would drift into painting or some aspect of Dornoch for which he had a great passion. It was a small cosy room with a big roaring fire in the winter and I would always leave with a problem resolved and faith in the task ahead.

The museum was eventually finished and has evolved into the success it is today. We continue to sell the two books that he wrote and donated to the museum based on some of his lectures about the Cathedral and its ministers.

The museum continues to give great enjoyment to the many visitors from all over the world and great interest to all those involved in its development.

It was a privilege and a pleasure to have known and worked with Ian and the legacy that is Historylinks is a lasting tribute to him.
